"Gentlemen,-In opening the first sitting of the first medical council that has allowed itself to be associated with

this department it becomes my duty, after thanking you for the public spirit and benevolence you have shown in undertaking this service to the community, to point out briefly both what appear to me to be the general objects in respect of which your assistance and advice will be useful, and the more special and immediate matters to which your attention is invited at present.

"I am charged with the responsible duty of directing the , sanitary administration of the country, so far as we have as yet anything deserving the name.

"But upon scientific matters connected therewith, where the medical profession are to be consulted, advised with, ' laid under contribution for service or information, or called upon to act, I wish to have the aid of a medical council to whom I may submit questions for consideration, and whom I may ask to suggest or undertake inquiries as may from time to time be necessary.

"The special work of this department is the application of the Public Health Act to such towns as petition for it. "Besides this, in times of epidemic, the board is charged ' with the duty of issuing regulations and directions for the prevention as far as possible or mitigation of disease. "It will be apparent that it is in connexion with the latter branch of my duties I shall have occasion for your

partment—should the science of public health take its place among the matters with which statesmanship may properly concern itself, as I believe must sooner or later be the case— , a wider field will be opened to this department and to the professional advisers whom it may be able to associate

"The circumstances of this country, its wealth and poverty, its great cities, with their social extremes of luxury and privation, its aggregation of individuals on the same spots, its multifarious industrial occupations, all point to the duty of studying the effects on life and health of trades, (callings, and processes, habitations, sites, water supply, sewerage, the adulteration of substances used for food,

"For this end I have the cordial co-operation of the Poor Law Board, the Registrar-General, and the Commissioners of Sewers for the metropolis, while all through the country the registration staff and the local boards of health may render me most useful service. But the most valuable result within my reach at present will be wanting unless I have your aid in procuring such information as to the concomitants and course of the epidemic as only medical and scientific observation can detect.

"Cholera is now very widely prevalent in London; up to the 2d of September 4,070 persons have died of the disease in the metropolis alone. "I purpose to direct inquiries into the conditions which attend the presence of the epidemic, so far as they can be gathered from meteorological, microscopical, and chymical

"The gentlemen who have undertaken to conduct these inquiries are here, and will detail for your approbation what

"But, besides this, I have caused a form to be drawn up, , which I propose, with your approval, and after it has been ! settled by you, to have circulated among all the qualified medical practitioners in London, with a view to determine the number of cases of choleraic disease, the proportion of deaths and recoveries, and the treatment pursued in each '

"The settlement of this return is the immediate object of this meeting of the council.

"I wish, also, that Dr. Sutherland should state to you ' what has been done in the way of providing for superintendence of the execution by local authorities of the directions and regulations of the Board, and I shall be much obliged if you would aid me by any suggestion as to other means for this purpose that you may think desirable to be

"I have also directed to be laid before you copies of the handbills issued by the Board, giving plain advice adapted ' the emergency. Any suggestions as to these I shall thankful for, as, indeed, for everything that may briefly and clearly inform the public mind, and, while promoting calmness and confidence in the means of prevention, cate these means, in the way best adapted to popular ap-

Sir,-Why is it that Her Majesty's ships in the Black Sea are suffering such frightful losses from cholera, while we do not hear that such is the case, at any rate to the same extent, in the merchant service? I think I can mention one cause which may be sufficient to account not only for this, but also for the great ordinary mortality in Her Majesty's navy from other and especially

The men have no meal from 4 o'clock in the afternoon to So'clock next morning--i.e., they have no food for 16 consecutive hours! But this is not all; a considerable portion of these 16 hours is spent on deck in exposure to the night air, and, it may be, to wind and rain; and at about 4 or 5 o'clock in the morning—i. e., after a fast of 12 or 13 hours the men are employed in holystoning the decks, which involves kneeling and walking in cold water for upwards of

Now, if any one has any doubts of the serious effects of such a system as this, let him test it in his own person. Let him eat a moderate meal of biscuit and cocoa at 4 in the afternoon; then, after spending part of the night exposed to the damp night air, let him, at 5 in the morning, on a stomach that has had no food for 13 hours, spend an hour in paddling and splashing about with bare feet and legs in cold water; and if cramp in the stomach and diarrhoea do not ensue, he may comfort himself with the reflection that he has a very wonderful constitution. Why do not the naval surgeons protest against a system which they must well know is destructive of health?

I have heard sailors in the navy speak bitterly of their sufferings while holystoning the decks after these long fasts; and to this and the violent exertions which they are often obliged to make in exercising in crack ships I have heard them attribute the fact that so many sailors in the navy I shall be glad to hear that there is anything to modify the statement I have made, but I must repeat that I have heard these complaints from the lips of sailors themselves. and they must be the best judges of the effects produced on them by such a system

THE DIRTIEST TOWN IN SCOTLAND.

Sir,—As the quotation from the Northern Ensign in The Times of to-day, regarding "the dirtiest town in all Scotland," may do an unmerited injury to the locality in question, will you kindly allow me, a native of the place, a line or two in explanation? Wick is the greatest herring-curing station in the world;

and the trade, which gives employment not only to the inhabitants of the place, but to thousands from other parts who annually resort to its shores, is confined to the narrow space of six weeks in the year, commencing about the middle of July, and ending about the termination of August. The visit of the officer from the Board of Health was paid in the last week of the fishing season, when all was bustle. and, from the very nature of the business, filth, although filth of a temporary duration. A visit to Billingsgate will show us that working with fish is none of the cleanest of occupations; and what must necessarily be the condition during the herring season of a seaport with its 1,000 boats, each of which has this year averaged 100 crans (about 900 herrings go to the cran), and where this large quantity of fish is not only landed, but cured and shipped? Had the visit of the Board of Health official been postponed for a few weeks, when the thousands of Highlanders, Shetlanders, Orkney men, and Frith of Forth men would have returned to their homes, when the greater portion of the herrings would have been shipped, and when the curers would have their stations nicely trimmed, I am confident his opinion of Wick would have been very different from that which he is reported to have expressed.
