General Register Office: Cholera deaths for the week ending 2 September 1854 in the three subdistricts Snow investigated¹

The following list was first published in an appendix to the *Weekly Return* for 9 September 1854. It contains eighty-two deaths. John Snow made a copy of eighty-three deaths on 5 September. The discrepancy could be explained as follows: Given the typeset format of this appendix (in References of the Online Companion), a clerk at the General Register Office must have shown John Snow a handwritten list that contained a death that occurred by 2 September but wasn't reported until the following week. It would have appeared in the typeset list for deaths reported between 3 and 9 September.

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ST. JAMES WESTMINSTER; *Berwick-street*.—At 9 Hopkins-street, on 2d September, the widow of a bricklayer, aged 41 years, “cholera (36 hours).”

At 5 Bentick-street, on 1st September. a guncase-maker, aged 22 years, “cholera (12 hours).”

At 42 Broad-street, on 2d September, a tailor, aged 27 years, “Asiatic cholera (20 hours).”

At 6 Edward-street, on 1st September, the wife of a hairdresser, “diarrhoea (8 hours), cholera (12 hours).”

At 93 Wardour-street, on 2d September, a herald-chaser, aged 47 years, “Asiatic cholera (12 hours).”

At 9 Berwick-street, on 1st September, the son of a warehouseman, aged one year and 9 months, “cholera.”

At 83 Berwick-street, on 2d September, the wife of a French-polisher, aged 50 years, “Asiatic cholera (12 hours).”

At 28 Berwick-street, on 1st September, the widow of a carpenter, aged 40 years, “cholera (12 hours).”

At 41 Broad-street, on 1st September, the daughter of a tailor, aged 7 years, “cholera Asiatica (10 hours).”

At 12 New-street, on 1st September, the daughter of a coachman, aged 14 years “cholera (24 hours).”

At 8 Pulteney-court, on 1st September, the son of a porter, aged 8 years, “cholera (11 hours).”

At 9 Hopkins-street, on 2d of September, a bootcloser, aged 37 years, “cholera (13 hours).”

Clerks at GRO quoted the cause of death (# hours duration of illness) as listed on the death certificate.

At 9 Great Crown-court, on 2d September, the son of a shoemaker, aged 9 years, "cholera (one day)."

At 6 Queen's Head-court, on 27th August, the widow of an ironmonger, aged 72 years, "diarrhoea (2 days), epidemic cholera (24 hours)."

At 32 Little Pulteney-street, on 30th August, a clerk in the Board of Control, aged 37 years, "cholera (11 hours)."

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At 12 Portland-street, on 1st September, a waistcoat-maker, aged 24 years, "Diarrhoea from an excessive dose of Epsom salts (12 hours), epidemic cholera (10 hours)."

At 92 Berwick-street, on 1st September, the daughter of a bootcloser, aged 1 year and 11 months, "epidemic cholera (12 hours)."

At 43 Broad-street, on 1st September, a tailor, aged 38 years, "cholera (18 hours)."

At 10 Broad-street, on 2d September, the daughter of a tailor, aged 7½ years, "cholera Asiatica (6 hours)."

At 91 Wardour-street, on 1st September, a tailor, aged 50 years, "cholera (18 hours)."

At 77 Berwick-street, on 1st September, the wife of a mineral chaser, aged 22 years, "diarrhoea and cholera (18 hours)."

At 6 Poland-street, on 1st September, a stationer, aged 64 years, "cholera (12 hours)."

At 1 William and Mary-yard, on 1st September, the daughter of a fishmonger, aged 6½ years, "cholera (10 hours)."

At 6 Pulteney-court, on 2d September, the wife of a marine-store dealer, aged 53 years, "epidemic cholera (12 hours)."

At 9 Poland-street, on 1st September, the widow of a tailor, aged 48 years, "cholera (24 hours)."

At 52 Broad-street, on 2d of September, the daughter of a tailor, aged 10 years, "cholera (18 hours)."

At 71 Berwick-street, on 1st September, the daughter of a dyer, aged 8 years, "Asiatic cholera (13 hours)."

ST. JAMES WESTMINSTER; *Golden Square*.—At 16 Silver-street, on 2d September, a wife, aged 43 years, "cholera (28 hours)."

At 3 Marlborough-row, on 1st September, a son, aged 9 years, "cholera (14 hours)." No premonitory diarrhoea.

At 11 Marshall-street, on 2d September, a daughter, aged 24 years, "Indian cholera (25 hours)."

At 10 Cambridge-street, on 2d September, a widow, aged 59 years, "cholera (2 days)."

At 25 Great Pulteney-street, on 2d September, a wife, aged 53 years, "cholera."

At 4 Cross-street, on 2d September, a son, aged 7 years, "cholera (14 hours)."

At 8 Tyler-street, on 2d September, a porter, aged 59 years, "Asiatic cholera (26 hours)."

At 8 Tyler-street, on 2d September, a widow, aged 60 years, "dysentery (2 days), cholera (32 hours)."

At 22 Marshall-street, on 2d September, a son, aged 17 years, "Asiatic cholera (12 hours)."

At the Workhouse, Poland-street, on 2d September, a wife, aged 40 years, "cholera (10 hours)."

At 3 Cross-court, on 2d September, a wife, aged 30 years, "cholera (12 hours)."

At 18 Broad-street, on 2d September, a tailor, aged 25 years, "cholera Asiatica (12 hours)."

At 10 Cambridge-street, on 1st September, a cook, aged 33 years, "Asiatic cholera (23 hours)."

At 1 Marlborough-row, on 2d September, a tailor, aged 69 years, "cholera (11 hours)."

At 1 Cross-court, on 2d September, a hatter, aged 47 years, "Indian cholera (15 hours)."

At 55 Carnaby-street, on 2d September, a gentleman, aged 50 years, "Asiatic cholera (17 hours)."

At 40 Broad-street, on 2d September, a tailor, aged 25 years, "cholera (48 hours)."

At 1 Marshall-street, on 1st September, a widow, aged 44 years, "cholera (12 hours)."

At 51 Poland-street, on 1st September, a porter, aged 29 years, "cholera (8 hours)."

At 43 Marshall-street, on 1st September, a son, aged 4 years, “cholera (12 hours).”

At 32 Broad-street, on 31st August, a daughter, aged 5 years, “cholera (13 hours).”

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At 10 Cambridge-street, on 1st September, a police-constable, aged 46 years, “cholera (14 hours).”

At 32 Golden-square, on 31st August, a widow, aged 57 years, “cholera Asiatica.”

At 3 Marlborough-row, on 30th August, a wife, aged 42 years, “cholera (11 hours).”

At 13 Great Pulteney-street, on 1st September, a painter, aged 42 years, “cholera (18 hours).”

At 40 Carnaby-street, on 1st September, a wife, aged 35 years, “Asiatic cholera (16 hours).”

At 10 Marshall-street, on 1st September, a wife, aged 31 years, “cholera.”

At 7 South-row, on 2d September, a wife, aged 42 years, “chronic diar-

rhœa several months, cholera (9½ hours).”

At 34 Marshall-street, on 1st September, a servant, aged 78 years, “cholera (32 hours).”

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STRAND; *St. Anne, Sobho.*—At 9 Gerrard-street, on 27th August, a surgeon, aged 34 years, “Asiatic cholera (24 hours).”

At 16 King-street, on 31st August, a chairmaker, aged 16 years, “Asiatic cholera (19 hours).”

At 7 Grafton-street, on 29th August, the daughter of a gold and silver piercer, aged 10 months, “Asiatic cholera (12 hours), hydrocephalus.”

At 33 Wardour[-]street, on 1st September, the daughter of a boot-closer, aged 8 years, “Asiatic cholera (11 hours).”

At 7 St. Anne’s-court, on 1st September, a tailor, aged 35 years, “Asiatic cholera (26 hours).”

At 18 St. Anne’s-court, on 1st September, the wife of a cabinet-maker, aged 51 years, “Asiatic cholera (13 hours).”

At 33 Wardour-street, on 2d September, a pianoforte-maker, aged 23 years, “Asiatic cholera (16 hours).”

At 18 St. Anne’s-court, on 2d September, the daughter of a cabinet-maker, aged 21 years, “diarrhœa (2 days), cholera (14 hours).”

At 11 St. Anne’s-court, on 1st September, the wife of a carman, aged 32 years, “Asiatic cholera (20 hours).”

At 32 Wardour-street, on 2d September, the son of an iron plate worker, aged 2 years, “Asiatic cholera (7 hours).”

At 22 St. Anne’s-court, on 2d September, the daughter of a porter, aged 13 years, “Asiatic cholera (20 years).”

At 21 St. Anne’s-court, on 1st September, the wife of a labourer, aged 40 years, “Asiatic cholera (12 hours).”

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
