Cholera deaths in two sub-districts of St. James, Westminster for the weeks ending 2 and 9 September 1854¹

This supplemental document contains addresses of deaths, organized by streets, listed in the **Weekly Returns of 2 and 9 September 1854** that Edmund Cooper visited in its investigation. Thereafter, they entered their impressions of the sanitary state of each premises in a **schedule** attached to Cooper's report to the Metropolitan Commission of Sewers. Cooper also supervised the survey of that portion of the cholera field that lay within St. James, Westminster parish and the creation of a detailed map, termed a frontage plan, that listed house numbers; the lithographers drew a line in front of each house number on the **map** in which a cholera death occurred between 31 August and 9 September 1854, as well as bars behind the house numbers indicating the number of deaths registered at that address during this period.

Deaths listed in the *Weekly Return* ending 2 September 1854 are in black font.

Deaths that occurred on 1 and 2 September, but were registered late and listed in the *Weekly Return* ending 9 September, are colored **red**.

Deaths between 3 and 9 September in that return are colored **blue**.

Cooper did not investigate cholera deaths that occurred at the parish workhouse in Poland Street or those of residents from these two sub-districts who died in hospitals.
