TO THE EDITOR OF THE TIMES.

Sir,—Will you allow a working man to give his opinior respecting the cause of the recent outbreak of cholera in the parish of St. James's, Westminster? It is said by some that it was owing to the upturning of the soil when making the sewers last winter, the district having formerly been a burialground. It appears to me unreasonable to conclude that the poisonous gases then liberated should, after the lapse of several months, still linger in the neighbourhood, The causes—for I believe there are several—are not so remote. The one on which I should feel inclined to lay the greatest stress is the deplorable state of the closets, which are merely pans or cesspools, having no communication with the main drain. Bearing in mind that from the 26th of August till the 1st of September, when the epidemic broke ont, the weather was excessively warm, it may be easily imagined what a dreadful stench these places must have When I came to work in the neighbourhood, the | bourg. closet on the premises, for the accommodation of many men. was in such a filthy state that I had to go some distance to a publichouse, and buy a pint of beer, or a glass of ale, solely for the purpose of getting to a decent place, and often, when I could not leave my work, I have suffered great pain

and become quite sick. The next most powerful cause I believe to be the offensive smells from the street-gratings, to the potency of which everyone living in the district can testify. Where drains have been made from the houses to the main sewer, it appears they will not work without plenty of water; and during the drought at the latter end of August this was not forthcoming. Hence the effluvia from the gratings became more pungent, and the area of the district infected by

noxious influences was enlarged.

These I regard as the chief causes of the outbreak; but there are several minor ones which ought not to be overlooked. The district is hemmed in on all sides, so that the wind, no matter from what quarter it blows, has not free course. abounds in narrow streets and courts, which are not kept ' too clean. Nearly every house contains several families, the heads of which work at home; the rooms, therefore, cannot be properly ventilated and cleansed nor the bedding properly aired. People living in this way do not generally possess much stamina; not a few, I am afraid, have latterly had but a scanty supply of food, owing to the high prices of provisions; and justice compels me to add, that some may have further weakened their constitutions through intemperance. They were, so to speak, ripe for the sickle, Notwithstanding, therefore, what has appeared in your columns, I think I have mentioned sufficient to account for the severity of the calamity that has fallen upon us, without casting blame on the decayed remains our ancestors. I have thought that theory was not a sound one in itself, and that it was likely to turn away attention from the pregnant sources of diseas by which we are daily surrounded, and that is the reason why I venture to write to you. Give us plenty of pure air let our apartments, no matter how plain, have the accormodation decency requires; let water come gushing our streets and houses; and let us have sound beef, unadr terated bread, and a glass of wholesome beer.

The adoption of one standard book of hymns, and of one standard book of tunes, would greatly tend to promote this oneness. There is yet one other argument in favour of this standard —and that is, hymns and tunes answer their purpose best when they are familiar hymns and tunes. They are not novel performances to be listened to, but they are intended for devotional exercises, to be joined in by all the congregation It is impossible for the people to know the tunes and unite in singing them if such an endless variety is to be in daily use that, if the name of the tune was announced at church and at home you sought it in three or four tune books, chances are against you that you would find it in either. I feel that my pen and your columns could scarcely be engaged on a subject of more general interest to the religious enjoyment of the Christian community than upon this selection of one universal standard, and I therefore hope you will give to myself and others—should any one else take up this interesting subject—a place in your extensively-read and widely-circulated paper.
