Last Friday, a group of Trustees of Princeton University met with students and faculty members to discuss the issue of Princeton's 300 million dollar investment in South Africa's apartheid system. After an hour of discussions, some of the Trustees were calling Princeton's present policy "inadequate," out of step with the times. Another Trustee, pointing out the window to the students and faculty gathered to vigil outside, said, "This is the best of America out there protesting our policy."

Some of the Trustees proposed setting up a committee to spend the summer to develop alternatives to the present policy. Then President Bowen spoke, and made the issue a vote of confidence. No committee was formed.

If you're one of the 3000 students or 300 faculty members who signed a petition for divestment, President Bowen has just shown you how much he values "dialogue."

So this morning, student and faculty members have joined together to show Bowen that stonewalling will be met with stonewalling. For one day, we will peacefully blockade the entrances to Nassau Hall.
